China Lake Pave Knife Program

In July, 1972, RADM Moe Wittman, Commander Navy Air Pacific (AIRPAC), requested China Lake to recommend a Quick Reaction Program to provide the fleet with a self-contained capability for airborne delivery of the Navy inventory of laser guided bombs (LGB)s in Vietnam.

The Air Force had Pave Knife pods on their F-4 Phantoms and were realizing great success with the precision LGB delivery in hostile environments.

The Pave Knife pod consisted of a low light level TV, Laser Designator, Laser Range Receiver, video recorder, and stabilized sight permitted lower hemisphere coverage and provided aircraft flexibility to continue lasing when egressing the target area.

Phil Arnold was assigned the job, and teamed with Chuck Smith, Arnold's Division Head, to assess the options. China Lake had already deployed handheld laser designators that were developed under the leadership of Conrad Neal and Leonard Haugen in Code 4051, of the Weapons Department led by Frank Knemeyer. Arnold recommended the quickest solution would be to acquire three Pave Knife pods and adapt them to the A-6A aircraft. The A-6 aircraft equipped with Pave Knife could designate and deliver LGBs and designate targets in support of other aircraft armed with LGBs.

China Lake was tasked to lead the Quick Reaction Capability effort.

Attack Squadron VA-145 was designated to provide three aircraft and a special detachment to El Toro Marine Air Base and work with China Lake to integrate, evaluate and deploy the Navy Pave Knife system using the Quick Reaction Capability (QRC) priority. Commander Rupe Owens, Attack Squadron VA 145 Skipper (RADM, USN retired) led the VA-145 contingent.

China Lake led the effort to acquire three Pave Knife pods from Philco Ford (later Aeronutronic-Ford) in Newport Beach. The VA-145 aircraft already included upgrades in support of the Condor program (which had been cancelled) that mitigated major aircraft changes to adapt to the Pave Knife pod interface. The effort included establishing carrier suitability, addition of the necessary ship-board support facilities on the USS Ranger (CVA-61) and the test and evaluation of the integrated system on the China Lake ranges.

The required Pave Knife instruments were integrated into the cockpit. The bombardier navigator (BN) in the right seat was provided the hand controller for the laser designator, and a combined radar/TV display previously developed for the Condor program. The pilot displays in the left seat were upgraded to include laser range display and sightline indicators. In operation the BN lined up the camera and designator and tracked the target. The pilot used the sight-line indicators to maintain a heading that would not exceed the gimbal limits of the pod's optics.

Within five months, VA-145 was flying combat missions in Vietnam providing precision attacks on strategic targets. In one mission a coordinated strike involving several squadrons from the USS Ranger destroyed 16 bridges in less than three hours with other aircraft delivering the LGBs on the Pave Knife designated targets. VA-145 flew 85 successful Pave Knife sorties before the USS Ranger returned to their home port in June 1973.

The Navy Pave Knife was a China Lake success story. It was a quick reaction program completed within budget, that provided a vitally needed capability for the Navy's forces at war. By 1977, the Pave Knife system had been installed on Fleet A-6Es as well. It provided the only stabilized airborne laser designation capability for the Navy until 1980. In 1980 the A-6E Target Recognition and Attack Multisensor (TRAM), in which China Lake was also significantly involved, was introduced to the Fleet as the replacement technology in a much smaller package, fully integrated into the A-6E avionics suite.

Home-made Play Dough

You'll Need:

- 1 C. Flour
- ½ C. Table Salt
- 1 Tbsp. Oil
- 2 Tbsp. Cream of Tartar
- 1 C. Boiling Water
- Food Coloring

Instructions:

- 1. In a bowl, combine the flour, salt and cream of tartar. Mix well.
- 2. Add the oil.
- 3. Mix a few drops of food coloring into the boiling water and add to the bowl.
- 4. Mix everything very well and massage with your hands until it is no longer sticky.
- 5. Once it has fully cooled, wrap in plastic and put in an airtight container. Store at room temperature for up to 6 months.
